Victim One, Witness One and Witness Two said

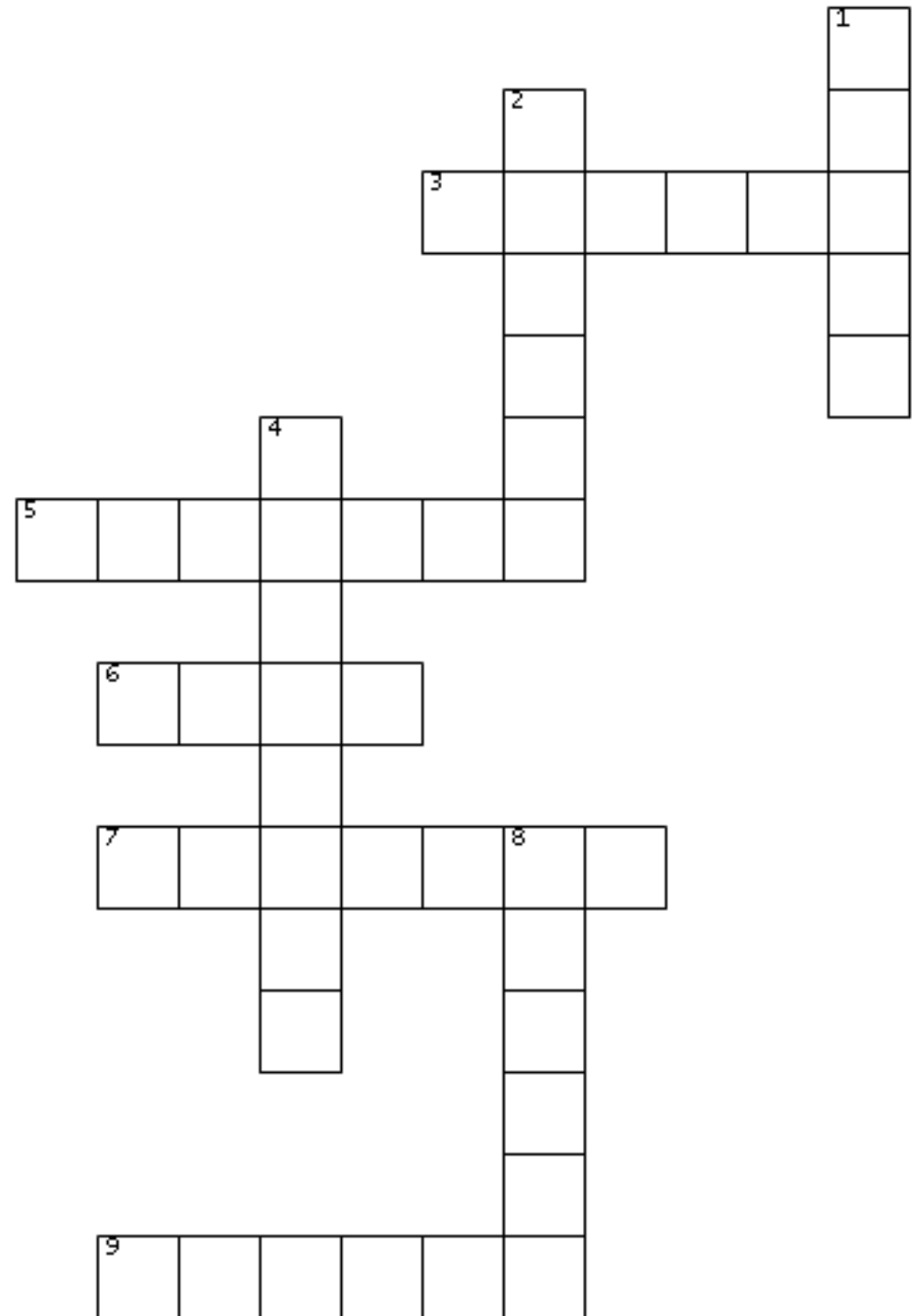
Suspect Two repeatedly hit Victim One's hand during a game of cards on Jan. 9.

## Hemingway-Pfeiffer Museum and Educational Center to lead Cuba trip

In celebration of its 25th anniversary, the Hemingway-Pfeiffer Museum and Educational Center (HPMEC) will lead a trip to Cuba this spring.

The trip will begin on May 25, and continue through June 1.

Ernest Hemingway lived in Cuba for more than two decades. He wrote "The Old Man and the Sea," for which he won a Pulitzer Prize, at the home he called Finca Vigía or "lookout farm," which is located nine miles outside of Havana, where he and his wife shared their home with dozens of their beloved cats. Attendees will experience

sites associated with Ernest Hemingway in Cuba. They will also be able to exchange ideas with the Cuban people and will be introduced to their culture and history through interaction with local artists, musicians and farmers.

Travelers will visit historical places and United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization World Heritage Sites during the trip.

Those who take part in this special trip will learn about past and present restoration projects in Havana and tour architectural marvels including Instituto Superior de Arte-ISA, which is The University of Arts of Cuba.

In addition to many places

in Havana, travelers will visit Viñales, where they will see orchids in the wild and waterfalls at El Salto, as well as visit a working tobacco plantation.

Arkansas State University's annual Agribusiness Conference, now in its 30th year, continues to provide timely information and agricultural policy education to farmers, agribusiness professionals, students and educators across the Mid-South.

This year's conference, scheduled for Feb. 7, will focus on agribusiness trends, sustainability issues, the next farm bill, and agricultural commodity markets.

On-site registration opens at 7:30 a.m. in A-State's

Fowler Center, 201 Olympic Dr. Lunch and afternoon sessions will be held in the on-campus Embassy Suites by Hilton Red Wolf Convention Center, 223 Red Wolf Blvd. Afternoon sessions end at 3 p.m.

The noon luncheon features Dana Brooks, CEO of the Pet Food Institute. While an undergraduate student at A-State, she assisted with the first A-State Agribusiness Conference. Brooks also will participate in the afternoon session on animal health issues and the A-State College of Veterinary Medicine, which is in development.

Other afternoon concurrent sessions cover the situation and

outlook for rice and cotton.

The conference qualifies for continuing education credits according to the guidelines of the Arkansas State Board of Public Accountancy, Arkansas Certified Crop Advisors and Arkansas Agricultural Consultants, and the American Society of Farm Managers and Rural Appraisers.
